

TODAY: Our speaker has an appropriate subject for the beginning of a new year. Commodore WARD HORNBLOWER PROESCHER's topic is: "The Magic of Believing in Yourself".

A good way to start the New Year - the induction of a new member. Hard to believe but the entire population of the county at that time was only 10,000 with RC at only 1650. Already, San Francisco was over 250,000 and even Marin and Alameda far exceeded SM which at that

time was principally a land of great estates. An interesting trip into time!


Your finemaster is expected to be DR. ALAN BOSTWICK. Need we say more.





ROTARY COMES OF AGE: From 1905 until 1910 Rotary was somewhat of an amalgamation of boys clubs formed for purposes of fellowship. In 1910 this amalgamation formed itself into the National Association of Rotary Clubs and it held its first Convention in Chicago, Illinois, U.S.A. Paul P. Harris became Rotary's first president and Chesley R. Perry was elected as the first secretary. The Objects of Rotary were formulated at this milestone Convention. That year, there were 16 clubs with an estimated membership of 1,500. And the first Rotary club outside the U.S.A. was formed in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada.

Today Rotary consists of 23,906 clubs with a membership of 1,062,058 in 465 districts and 164 countries.



With much sadness we report the passing of DR. ROBERT BROWN this past Wednesday. BOB was a charter member and past president of RC Rotary and a Rotarian for some 42 years. A dedicated and much respected civic leader, he will be greatly missed by his many friends and associates. He was 76. Our deep sympathy goes out to JEAN and all the family.

TODAY: It's "Past President's Day" and in celebration of Rotary Foundation Month we are delighted and honored to be enjoying another visit from fellow Rotarian and R.I. Director RICK KING. It's always nice to be able to mix inspiration and pleasure and that is something RICK KING can do like no other.

Welcome and a toast to all you past presidents and spouses who are able to join in today's celebration. May your many and substantial past contributions to R.C. Rotary not be forgotten and may we continue to enjoy the benefit of your experience and ongoing efforts in behalf of Rotary on each and every tomarrow.

Today, lurking about in the shadows is our "Mystery Finemaster". He is Historically one of the finest masters of the art of fining... no one will be safe.

LAST WEEK: Pres. BOB called on ALLEN GRUMAN to lead the song, MIKE PETERSON to lead the pledge and himself for the invocation.

Finemaster DR. BOB DURKIN played some kind of game with members names - but then, what kind of flight of fancy can you expect from a bird with one wing!

At Pres. BOB's request ED NISSAN called on his background to give a brief but incisive analysis of the Satanic Verses crisis as it might be seen from the Moslem world and, of course, Iran.

With Mexico's entire economic output equal to only two thirds of that of metropolitan L.A. it is easy to see why drug trafficking has reached such major proportions with one third of the marijuana, heroin and cocain entering the U.S. coming via Mexico.

What follows in politics and corruption is a grim picture indeed and BILL gave us all the grim facts.






And among the many guests, PDG SID's lovely new Roteriann, PEGGY.



Congratulations to these two fine clubs that have made Rotary history by taking the initiative in proposing this well intentioned legislation.

The new Rotarians are members of the Rotary Club of St. Pierre at Miquelon in District 782. The club was chartered in March with 26 members.
